

History Division Call for Panel Proposals

The History Division of the Association for Journalism and Mass Communications is seeking panel proposals for the 2015 AEJMC national conference in San Francisco. The Division aims to offer a diverse, engaging and creative program that represents the depth and breadth of our members' research, teaching, and professional interests. Members are especially encouraged to submit proposals that take advantage of the conference's location in San Francisco and of the conference's central theme of "Global Bridges."

Panel proposals are due by **September 30, 2014**, and should include the following information:

- ✚ AEJMC group proposing the panel (History Division) and contact person for panel with email (this information should appear at the top of the proposal)
- ✚ Suggested co-sponsoring divisions or interest groups. If you have already made a deal with another division or interest group to co-sponsor your panel, please indicate that in the proposal. If you haven't made a deal, that's fine. But please remember that the panel will be more attractive to other divisions/interest groups if you include members from their group or leave space for them on the panel. - ✚ Title of panel
- ✚ Type of panel (Teaching, Research, or Professional Freedom & Responsibility*)
- ✚ 250-word (maximum) summary of session topic, including the goal, content, and an explanation of the significance and originality of the topic and its interest to AEJMC members.
- ✚ Speakers' names, affiliations and brief backgrounds. A panel typically has four speakers and preferably with gender, ethnic and institutional balance. Please try to get commitments from speakers before submitting the proposal whenever possible—and please indicate in the proposal whether the speakers are committed.
- ✚ Estimated speaker costs, if any
