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NOND seeks nominations for Educator of the Year Award

The Educator of the Year Award is open to any journalism instructor who is a full-time faculty member of a bachelor degree-granting institution of higher education in the United States. The nominee should have a demonstrated track record of achievement in preparing journalism students, advancing journalism education, and promoting career development. Please attach a nomination package consisting of the following:

1. A letter of nomination of no more than two single-spaced pages showcasing the nominee's achievements in teaching. This letter should indicate the nominator's name, title, school/organization/affiliation, email address, and phone number.

- 2. A copy of the nominee's curriculum vitae.
- 3. A maximum of three letters of support from the nominee's students, former students and industry professionals may also be included. Each of these letters should be no more than one single-spaced page. These letters

should be included in the submission, attached to the ONE email, and not sent separately from individual letter writers

Beyond Storytelling: How to Turn Oral History into Scholarship and Public Knowledge

Start your #AEJMC2015 convention with a workshop cosponsored by the History and the Newspaper & Online News Division on Wednesday, August 5, from 1 to 5 p.m. In recent decades, oral history has been increasingly recognized as vital to understanding the plurality yet connectedness of human experiences. Journalists, as witnesses, chroniclers, and sometimes agents of history, have been important subjects in numerous oral history collections. Oral history, however, is often misperceived as random collections of personal accounts of the past. This workshop will focus on turning oral history into publishable scholarship, transforming oral history into public knowledge through digital archiving, and using oral history to explore neglected or suppressed media and cultural phenomena. The panelists will showcase their oral history projects and discuss a wide range of topics related to oral history research. TNT21 was founded in 2009 to publicly acknowledge good ideas for teaching three types of foundational journalism courses – newswriting, reporting and editing – by three types of instructors:

- Full-time faculty members
- Adjunct professors
- Graduate-student instructors


A prize of \$100 will be awarded for the best teaching idea from each group of instructors. The summer deadline gives you time to enter the ideas you used in classes in fall 2014 and spring 2015.



Teaching ideas should be tailored for use in teaching newswriting, reporting or editing courses in a world where technologies for creating and delivering journalism are rapidly changing. For example, the competition would welcome tips for teaching newswriting across media, using social media in editing courses or exploring the ethical implications of reporting under-

verified information online. Teaching ideas may be tailored for specific versions of newswriting, reporting or editing courses, such as sports reporting, business reporting or environmental reporting. All ideas, however, should help professors address the challenges of the 21st century classroom.

Ideas will be judged for their originality, innovative nature, ease of application, completeness and writing. In addition, judges will take into account whether the ideas would work in more than one course and/or at different types of schools. All ideas submitted should be:

• Original. Please do not submit any work that has been published or presented elsewhere or that is borrowed from another instructor's work. Please do not submit anything that has already been a winner or a finalist in another AEJMC or journalism and mass communication teaching ideas competition. Submitting such work

may result in disqualification.

• Classroom-tested. Please do not submit ideas that you have not yet used.

Winners will be announced on the Newspaper and Online News Division Twitter feed, @AEJMC_NOND; website, http://aejmc.net/news; and e-mail listserv during the AEJMC convention in San Francisco.

Entrants do not have to attend the convention to win.

Newspaper Research Journal joins SAGE Publications in winter 2015

Tewspaper Research Journal joined the ranks of the many prestigious journals published by SAGE Publications, Inc., starting with the winter 2015 issue, after the Newspaper and Online News Division signed a five-year contract with the publisher. The move to SAGE will broaden the readership and give earlier access online to published articles. Until the SAGE website for NRJ is complete, however, reviewers, authors and others should use the current website of http://newspaperresearchjournal.org. From there, you will be directed to http://nrj.sagepub.com, once that website is fully operational.

Also, when the new SAGE website is complete and the tracking system is "up," all members of the editorial board will get a username and a password so they can access manuscripts for review. Meanwhile, those who want to read NRJ published articles online can go to www.sagepub.com, click on "Journals" and enter "Newspaper Research Journal" in the search box. With the transition to Sage, the editors and the editorial review process will remain the same.
