Lowrey named top educator

Wilson Lowrey, an associate professor at the University of Alabama, is the recipient of the Newspaper & Online News Division's Educator of the Year award for 2013. With characteristic humility, he reacted to being told by replying, "Wow, I'm stunned. They always say `I'm so grateful and humbled' at awards banquets . . . but I truly am!"



Doctoral student Betsy Emmons predicted just such a reaction. "Dr. Lowrey is one of the most humble and down-to-earth people you'll ever meet," she wrote. "He truly puts his students' interests first and deflects self-focus. Even though he is guite prolific, he doesn't brag Wilson Lowrey about it; I didn't realize how published he was

until I ran a search and saw just how much research he's done! He will probably have the same 'aw, shucks' attitude about this award that he has when he is praised for other thinas."

His department chair, Jennifer Greer, wrote in his support, "No one could overstate what an integral part of Continued on Page 3

the faculty here Wilson is. The thing that amazes me about him is that he's such a brilliant researcher but that he's so connected with the profession and current trends. He moves seamlessly back and forth between the two worlds. His research addresses real-world issues

but it is grounded in theory and is quite complex in the problems it tackles, which is not an easy task."

"Honestly," she went on to say, "he's just the poster boy for wellrounded academic."
