Midwinter AEJMC provides a glimpse of the future of international and global communication research By Vanessa Higgins

The University of Oklahoma hosted the AEJMC midwinter conference for the 15th consecutive year at the beautiful facilities of the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication. Staying true to its name, in an unseasonably cold late February (24-25), the conference included several sessions and workshops on current topics, including many with emphasis on global and international communication.

The International Communication Division (ICD) presented four sessions including 17 individual papers: Western newspapers coverage of global issues, Social media's effect on interpersonal and social interactions internationally, International politics, public opinion, and image, Mediating and news coverage in India, Bangladesh and USA. ICD accepted 40 faculty papers out of 69 papers entered for the Robert L/ Stevenson Open Paper Competition. ICD received 47 student papers, entered for the James Markham competition. Of those, ICD accepted 23 papers.

The conference provided an excellent setting for thoughtful discussions, which often spilled from the presentation rooms to the coffee breaks and lunches. ICD awarded the top paper/abstract to Md Mahbubul Haque Bhuiyan from the University of Houston, for his study Weaponizing the religion in Facebook against the women in Bangladesh.

With abstract submissions at the end of the fall semester, Midwinter conference provides grad students and faculty a great chance to present their research with extensive opportunity for feedback and collaboration. The 15th edition of Aejmc midwinter gave our division excellent visibility to the work of up-and-coming scholars in international and global communication, and a glimpse of things to come.

Are We There Yet? Journalism Education During the Social Media Age in South Asia

Social Media have brought a paradigm shift in journalism and journalism education is in transition in this ever-changing media landscape in the Global South. The process of news has been getting complex and challenging as the journalists have to adapt with the social media tools from gathering to disseminating news. With the advancement of digital media, South Asian journalism educational institutions have been trying to adopt new pedagogy, redesign curricular alongside utmost struggle to adapt with the new and changing scenario.

The process of news has been ever evolving as social media provides unlimited opportunities to get information from the digital sphere. In addition, the traditional model of getting information from the mainstream media is withering away and the economic existence of journalism is in jeopardy. Access to the sources has become much easier and journalists could reach new audiences and increase the visibility of news. On the other hand, the social media landscape has also been putting pressure on journalists to keep up with the pace of breaking the news. Given the ever evolving South Asian journalism education landscape, this book aims to address the following questions: Are South Asian journalism educational institutions ready and equipped to train journalists in the social media age? What are the challenges of journalism education and how should those challenges be addressed?

In this book, the authors from the South Asian countries will highlight the challenges and opportunities of journalism education in the digital and social media age in South Asia. The book aims to house scholars from various backgrounds who have experience in journalism education in all South Asian countries. It tends to cover the scenario of journalism education in Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka. The book aims to cover the issue in the methodological and theoretical discussion and challenges regarding the reciprocal engagement between journalism educational institutions and journalists from both local and regional perspective.

Dr. Sharma earned her Ph.D. in Public Communication and Technology from Colorado State University, Fort Collins. She also received her M.A. from Panjab University, India. Her research interests include social media, journalism, and the South Asian news and entertainment media.


Dr. Sharma's research appears in journals including the International Journal of Communication, Psychology of Popular Media, Journal of Communication Inquiry, Global Media and Communication, and Atlantic Journal of Communication, among others. She is currently working on her sole-author book project, Online Abuse, hatred and women journalists in India. Currently, Dr. Sharma serves as the PF&R chair of the International Communication Division (ICD), AEJMC. Dr. Sharma worked as a journalist with the two leading media, The Times of India and The Indian Express, in India.

Delaware Arif (Ph.D.) is a digital journalism associate professor in the Department of Communication at the University of South Alabama, USA. He teaches Digital Writing & Production, Multimedia Storytelling, Social Media, and Ethics and Social Responsibility. Dr. Arif also taught mass communication courses at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater for one year. Dr. Arif was an assistant professor in the Department of Communication and Journalism at the University of Chittagong in Bangladesh. He also served as chairman of the department until coming to the U.S. to pursue his Ph.D.

Before joining teaching in 2002, Delaware worked for Reuters, Bangladesh National News Agency (BSS) and an international NGO, the Hunger Project. Dr. Arif earned his Ph.D. in Mass Communication and Media Arts at Southern Illinois University Carbondale (SIUC) focusing on the patterns of usage of social media among the South Asian diaspora group in the U.S. He also received his M.A. in media theory & research from SIUC. Dr. Arif completed the Training for Trainers course at the International Institute for Journalism (IIJ) in Germany. He received his B.A. and M.A. in mass communication and journalism from the University of Dhaka in Bangladesh. His teaching and research areas revolve around social media, new media, political communication, international communication, journalism studies, race and media, and mass media ethics.


Book Summary


Global Journalism: Understanding World Media Systems provides a comprehensive overview of the key issues in global journalism today and traces how media systems have evolved over time in different world regions. With topics ranging from global media freedom and journalistic cultures to foreign news reporting and public diplomacy, conceptual content is presented in accessible style and supplemented by timely case studies. The book features contributions by 22 media scholars from 14 countries and includes chapter summaries as well as discussion questions at the end of each chapter.
