CT&M CONCEPTS Professional Freedom & Responsibility Panels for 2020

PF&R Chair benjaminkjohnson@ufl.edu T&M plans to co-sponsor two Professional Freedom and Responsibility panels at the 2020 conference in San Francisco. Each session will address emerging challenges and opportunities for communication researchers in the new decade.

The first panel is hosted in conjunction with the Communication Technology (CTEC) division, and will focus on industry-academy partnerships. There is a continued or even increased appetite from academics to gain access to industry datasets. Likewise, media and technology firms often recognize the unique value of collaborating with university scientists. However, collaborations and data sharing can pose logistic and ethical challenges, given differences in routines and priorities between the two fields. In this panel, we will hear from both industry professionals and academics who have embarked on successful collaborations. The panel will focus on how to plan for and maximize potential collaborative opportunities, and what the future of media and technology industry-academy partnerships may look like.

The second panel is hosted in conjunction with the Mass Communication & Society (MC&S) division, and is about open science practices. A growing reform movement in scientific research has brought renewed attention to the need for replication, transparency, and rigor. Under the banner of "open science," new practices such as pre-registration and preemptive data sharing have also taken hold across a variety of scientific disciplines. Communication research appears to be on the cusp of moving toward more open practices in research, too. Mass communication researchers from different career stages, and with distinct theoretical and methodological perspectives, will discuss the changes they've made in their research routines, and what they see as the future of open practices in communication research. In particular, the panel will stress the professional and ethical principles at stake in open science.

Teaching Panels for 2020

The CT&M Division will host two teaching panels at the 2020 conference in San Francisco. The first panel, co-sponsored with the Graduate Student Interest Group, will focus on how to prepare future scholars and practitioners for solving quantitative problems that might require computational thinking. By bringing together a group of experts who teach and apply computational methods to conduct their research, we will explore the do's and don'ts of teaching these skills to students at both graduate and undergraduate levels. Such skills might include computational methods, code literacy, data journalism, measurement and analytics, and web/social media management. As a division that focuses on the development and application of research methods, the CT&M Division proposes this panel to discuss best practices, common challenges, and future endeavors of teaching computational methods to students in communication-related fields.

The second panel aims to critically address how we teach theory building in media and communication classes. This panel will share what we have learned about teaching theory including how to structure these courses and example assignments. The biggest challenges to teaching students theory building is getting students to think abstractly and identify meaningful theoretical problems. The panelists will address how educators teach students on how to make significant theoretical contributions to scholarship and how to communicate them.
