Dear MSCD Members,

How time flies! Now that Spring is around us, I'd like to share some exciting news with you. This year our division teams up with the AEJMC Committee on Career Development (<u>https://www.aejmc.com/home/2021/09/committee-on-career-development/</u>) to launch the AEJMC-MCSD Diversity and Inclusion Career Development Fellowship for Graduate Students for a trial period of three years.

As you know, we sent out two emails to all our members, one on 1/26/2023 and the other on 2/13/2023, calling for members' votes on this new initiative using Qualtrics. In total, 51 members votes (including 1 non-member vote) were received, accounting for roughly 10% of our current MCSD members. The votes are heavily in favor of the new initiative – 4 members voted "not support", 47 members voted "support".

We are grateful to the feedback received from our members and welcome your input anytime as we move forward this collaboration. With it, we will be able to engage future student leaders of diverse background into this fellowship program and connect them with our amazing pool of faculty (tenure-track and non-tenure track) as their mentors. We will also host webinars and online office hours throughout the year. Your ideas and participation are always welcomed! ## MCS Hosts Panel Discussions

In the past few months, vice heads of all AEJMC divisions, interest groups, and commissions have been busy with the panel co-sponsorship bidding process for this year's annual conference. During this time, we reviewed each other's panel proposals and made deals to co-sponsor panels we believe would benefit our members. I am pleased to announce that we have lined up six exciting panels, including two research panels, two teaching panels, and two professional freedom and responsibility (PF&R) panels. You can read about these panels and our co-sponsors below.



## 1. Growing a National Participatory Civic Media Network (PF&R panel)

Co-sponsor: Participatory Journalism Interest Group

The Documenters Network is a growing national network of newsrooms and community organizations committed to participatory civic media. This panel discusses the core curriculum for Documenters and local evolutions and innovations co-created with local Documenters and newsrooms.

2. Teaching Computational Communication Research Methods (teaching panel)

**Co-sponsor:** Communication Theory and Methodology

This panel seeks to discuss teaching strategies in research methods courses for including computational social science research methods and tools used in journalism and mass communication.

3. The Value of Entertainment Scholarship for Theory and Research (research panel) Co-sponsor: Entertainment Studies Interest Group

The panel spotlights the contributions from the edited volume, "Entertainment and Media Communication." It aims to summarize and provoke the applied and theoretical study of entertainment for present and future scholars of journalism and mass communication.

4. Fair Chance Diversity Sourcing & Reporting (teaching panel)

## Co-sponsor: Commission on the Status of Minorities

Journalism has an ethical responsibility to reflect communities. Newsrooms and universities are developing freeware tools that reporters use to compare census demographics to their sourcing. Participants will experience the tools on their phones.

# 5. Restoring Truth and Trust in the Marketplace of Ideas: New Fronts in the Battle for Democracy (PF&R panel)

## Co-sponsor: Law & Policy Division

This panel will share new ideas for battling the "infodemic" of lies and fake news that has created a culture of disinformation that has diminished public trust in media and created anxiety about the future of democracy.

# 6. From White Privilege to Color-blindness, Exploring the Lack of Intersectionality When Reporting about Sexual Violence in the #MeToo 2.0 Era in the USA (research panel)

**Co-sponsor**: Commission on the Status of Women

This panel brings together five journalism scholars based in the US, the UK, and Australia who shine a light on the intersectional inadequacies in the US mainstream reporting about sexual violence in the #MeToo 2.0 era.

## Midwinter Conference 2023

The 15th AEJMC Midwinter Conference was held on February 24 and 25. The Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University



of Oklahoma hosted researchers and panelists from around the world. The AEJMC Mass Communication and Society (MCS) division was featured prominently on the conference program, with seven research paper sessions scheduled across both days of the conference.

MCS led the field with 49 abstract submissions – which was 25 percent of the total submissions received by all participating divisions. In total, the division presented 23 papers from about 41 authors in seven panels across both days of the conference. Highlights included sessions addressing health communication topics in social media, issues, trends, and youth in digital media, news media and the communication of science, news media and framing effects, insights in consumer behavior, and social media discourse and user engagement.

Thank you to all the members who volunteered to review submissions for the AEJMC Midwinter Conference.

The top abstract award was presented to Haley Hatfield and F. Aarum Youn-Heil from the University of Georgia for their paper, "On being human: An investigation of virtual influencers and activism." Top abstract award recognition was presented during the conference, and awards were mailed to the authors.

Much appreciation for organizing and hosting an engaging and seamless conference is extended to Dr. Elanie Steyn, Associate Dean at the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication, University of Oklahoma and organizer of the Midwinter Conference.

The Midwinter Conference is an annual event that attracts research from AEJMC members around the globe. The event has been hosted by the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of Oklahoma for over a decade. MCS is one of the twelve divisions and interest groups that participate in the Midwinter Conference. Midwinter is unique in that it accepts abstract submissions, and papers presented at the conference are eligible – and encouraged – to be submitted to the AEJMC Annual Conference in August.

# 2023 Mass Communication & Society Awards Opportunities

Greetings to everyone! The Awards Committee of Mass Communication and Society Division would like to call your attention to a



variety of exciting awards opportunities to celebrate your achievements in research and teaching.

This year, MCS is delighted to offer three research awards, including the Top Paper Awards that are part of the annual conference paper competitions, the Researwwch Award that funds 2 faculty-led and 1 graduate student-led research proposals, and the Dissertation Award that commends outstanding graduate research in the field of mass communication with an emphasis on interactions with the society. The Top Paper Awards encompass three research paper competitions (Open, Student, Moeller) and will honor the top three winners in each competition.

MCS provides five teaching awards in total: the Distinguished Educator Award to recognize an MCS member's significant contribution to mass communication pedagogy, the Promising Professors Award to recognize up to 3 junior faculty and up to 3 graduate students who demonstrate excellence and innovation in teaching, and the Adjunct/

The PF&R Award recognizes excellence in research, teaching, or service related to the five PF&R principles identified by AEJMC. These principles are the promotion of free expression; ethics; media criticism and accountability; racial, gender, and cultural inclusiveness; and public service. The PF&R award is worth 500 dollars. Instructor Award to recognize outstanding contributions of up to 3 adjuncts and instructors in advancing teaching excellence in the field of mass communication. We also hold the Teaching Ideas Competition to recognize innovation and excellence in teaching and offer the Service-Learning Award to assist faculty in their service-learning courses by offsetting a portion of the costs for working with communities, nonprofit clients, schools and governmental bodies in the classroom.

any individual who has made significant contributions to scholarship in any of these five areas or has undertaken professional or service activities that promote excellence in any of the five areas. The research, service, or professional activities could have been completed either during the preceding year or reflect work done over a longer period.

The Professional Award recognizes professionals for upholding the values of professional freedom and responsibility, diversity, and public service. This award is worth 250 dollars. It is also open to any individual who has spent a significant portion of her/his career in mass communication industries such as broadcast, print, photojournalism, advertising, public relations, and social media. Individuals must show initiatives that were undertaken to uphold these values for work within the areas of education, journalism, advertising, public relations, or a related field. Other worthwhile endeavors entail working within the community to promote social responsibility outside of normal work duties.

The Trayes Service Award honors exemplary service to the MCS Division, with a monetary award of \$500. The winner will be recognized at the Awards Luncheon at the national conference of AEJMC. It is worth mentioning that both the Professional Award and the Trayers Service Award received no application over the past year.

Some example awards available to students are the Dissertation Award (\$3,000), Research Award (\$5,000), Teaching Ideas Competition (up to \$250), Professional Freedom and Responsibility Award (\$500), the Student Travel Award (multiple awards between \$500-\$1000), and the newly voted on Diversity and Inclusion Career Development Fellowship (reimbursement of up to \$1,200 for conference travel).

Additionally, I would like to bring your attention to the Susanne A. Roschwalb Grant for International Study and Research. Students who's major and/or research emphasizes how public relations or mass communication interacts with society outside the United States are encouraged to apply!

To be eligible for most of these awards you must be a member of the MCS division. Again, please note that membership to MCS is free for students. In addition to applying for these awards, other benefits of joining the MCS division include a subscription to the flagship journal of the division "Mass Communication and Society" and access to other research and teaching-related initiatives and events sponsored by the division. Additionally, there are several opportunities to serve on committees or get involved in service to enhance your curriculum vitae (CV).

## Call for 2023 teaching awards in MC&S Division

"Applications are now being accepted for five teaching awards including the Distinguished Educator Award, the Promising Professors Awards, the Adjunct/Instructor Award, the Service-Learning Award, and the Teaching Ideas Competition for the year of 2023. Please seize the time to submit nomination or self-nomination.

The Distinguished Educator Award and the Promising Professors Awards aim to honour established and emerging educators in the field of mass communication. The Distinguished Educator Award is given to an educator who has made a significant contribution to mass communication pedagogy. The Promising Professors Awards honor new faculty and graduate students who demonstrate excellence and innovation in teaching.

In addition to honoring full-time teachers, MCS also give three Adjunct/Instructor Awards to recognize part-time educators who have made valuable contribution to the field of mass communication. The award is meant to acknowledge adjuncts and

#### instructors who advance teaching excellence in the field of

mass communication. All teaching faculty in the field of mass communication with a full time equivalent (FTE) less than 100% (e.g., on a semester-by-semester basis, or on bargaining-unit appointments) are welcomed to apply.

Finally, there are the service-learning award and the teaching ideas competition. Both awards aim to provide small amount of grant to fund community-based teaching projects in the field of mass communication and development of teaching ideas. The Service-Learning Award funds projects that encourage mass communication students to become involved in community work. The Teaching ideas Competition recognize projects that seek innovative approaches to advance education of mass communication.


## Facebook group AEJMC Mass Communication and Society Division (1,438 members [+43 members from Fall 2022])

From October 23, 2022, till March 27, 2023, MCS' Facebook group was viewed 6,495 times; 14 individuals posted in the group or made comments. Group content generated 211 engagements (201 reactions and 10 comments), yielding the average engagement rate of 3.2%, which is a 23 % increase from the average engagement rate measurement in the 2022 Fall report (2.6 %, August 1, 2022 to October 2022).

#### Twitter, @AEJMC\_MCS (3,490 followers [+14 followers from Fall 2022])

From October 23, 2022, till March 27, 2023, the Division's Twitter account gained 14 new followers. Fourteen (14) tweets were posted during that period, earning the total impressions of 4,697 (about 336 impressions per tweet). See top three tweets below.



In the past 28 days (March 2023), the average engagement rate is 7.4%, which is a 61% increase from the engagement rate measurement in October 2022 (4.6%).

The MC&S Twitter account was mentioned 30 times in the 28-day period (it is 8 mentioned higher than in October 2022).

Average engagement rate for both Facebook and Twitter accounts has increased remarkably from October 2022. Most popular content in both Facebook and Twitter accounts is scholarship announcements and AE-JMC- and MCS-related events (call for award nominations, conference announcements, reviewer invitations, etc.).
