1. Call to order and approval of minutes from 2020 business meeting

- Full minutes available on the ComSHER website
- All in favor Approved

2. 2020-2021 annual report update

- The state of the division is strong
- 394 total members (around 512 FB followers and 498 Twitter followers)
- Paper acceptance rate is within AEJMC preferred range (49-50%)
- New formats including the first DEIJ research session, ISC+ComSHER, and Preconference
- New division collaborations in place
- Increasing graduate student engagement as moderators, presenters, award winners
- Revitalization of the graduate committee
- Continuing to prioritize diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice in our division panel topics, collaborations etc.
- AEJ required 5-year reports and reviews have been delayed due to the COVID-19

3. 2021 financial update (i.e., 2021 by the numbers)

- Annual income ranges \$2,000-\$3,000 per year on average
- \$20 faculty membership fee (\$0 for graduate students)
- Balance As of May 2021, \$12,079 (before conference expenses)
 - o May 2016 \$5,850
 - o May 2017 \$6,965
 - o May 2019 around \$9,000
 - o May 2020 \$10,800
- Overall, the division finance is on a continued healthy trajectory
- 2021 annual expenses around \$4,500
 - o Eason Prize (around \$660 [\$1,000 endowment])
 - o Graduate student registration fees (instead of the social) (around \$351)
 - o Preconference honoraria (\$2,250)
 - o ISC+ComSHER Cohort Initiative (\$1,600)
 - o Certificate printing (\$300)
 - o Top Poster Award (\$100, sponsored by Nanyang University until 2023)
- 2022 expected budget about \$10,500

4. 2021 research competition update

- 215 submissions /6 disqualifications / 103 accepted (57 posters and 25 for panel papers)
- 49.40% acceptance rate for qualified papers (same as AEJMC overall)

• 57% student papers accepted (12 of 21)

5. Teaching panel update

- A total of 2 panels were organized and successfully completed on the below topics
 - o Assisting the student in crisis
 - o Inclusive pedagogy for online teaching

6. PF&R panel update

- A total of 2 panels were organized and successfully attended
 - New normal for journalism ethics in 2020: Journalists' responsibility in addressing misinformation in the year of Coronavirus, social protests, and natural disasters; Co-sponsored by ComSHER and Media Ethics Divisions
 - o Misinformation, racism, and the magnification of health inequities: Research informing publics and the practice (and vice versa); Co-sponsored by ComSHER and PR Divisions

7. Science Communication journal update

- 2-year impact factor

 - o (18/94 in Communication category)
- 5-year impact factor: 4.628
- Around 300 submissions per year
- 15% acceptance rate
- Added a managing editor, Ted Greenhalgh, to the editorial team
