


Henry Giroux: 2019 PF&R Award Winner

This award from division members recognizes Giroux for his work in numerous areas. Based at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, Giroux is Chair for Scholarship in the Public Interest and the Paulo Freire Distinguished Scholar in Critical Pedagogy. His research interests include cultural studies, youth studies, popular culture, media studies, and critical education studies. His work focuses on what he calls the war on youth, the neoliberalization and corporatization of higher education and culture more broadly, and youth social movements. He is the author or co-author of more than 65 books, including *The Public in Peril: Trump* and the Menace of American Authoritarianism (2017), America's Education Deficit and the War on Youth: Reform Beyond Electoral Politics (2013), Zombie Politics and Culture in the Age of Casino Capitalism (2011), and Border Crossings: Cultural Workers and the Politics of Education (1992). Giroux also has authored hundreds of journal articles, delivered more than 250 public lectures, and regularly contributed critical commentaries to news media outlets. He also is director of the Public Intellectuals Project, which provides a forum for academics, students, and other community members to communicate and discuss ideas about political issues of mutual concern.
