The scholar-to-scholar poster session will be Friday at 12:15 p.m., featuring two themes, *Technology and Electronic News*, and *News and Social Media*. Finally, *Local TV News and News Production* rounds out our divisional panels Saturday at 11:00 a.m. Congratulations to all of those who got papers accepted in this very competitive year.

Gary Hanson: 1951-2017

Gary Hanson, beloved emeritus professor in the School of Journalism and Mass Communication (JMC) at Kent State University, died on May 18, almost seven years after being diagnosed with cancer. Gary retired from Kent State in 2016 and was a favorite of students and alumni

during his 18-year tenure in JMC. He taught Broadcast Beat Reporting – a make-it-or-break-it class for broadcast journalism majors that he fondly called, "the class you came to Kent State to take" – Reporting Public Affairs; Media, Power and Culture: and more.

He cherished the time he spent with students inside and outside of the classroom. As adviser of TV2, the student-run television station, from 1999 to 2008 and from 2015 until his retirement, he spent many late nights working with students in the newsroom, editing suites, studio and control room, as he molded them into professionals.

Gary also pioneered study abroad opportunities for journalism and mass communication students. With his wife LuEtt Hanson, emerita associate dean of the College of Communication and Information who also retired in 2016, and his friend and

colleague Mitch McKenney, associate professor, he created the International Storytelling course, which takes students to different international destinations each spring to report and tell stories. Gary and LuEtt cherished the opportunity to share their love of travel with students; through International Storytelling, they were able to travel with more than 100 students to six countries and three continents

In 2011, Gary earned Kent State's most prestigious teaching honor, the Distinguished Teaching Award. Sponsored by the Alumni Association, the award is presented faculty members who demonstrate extraordinary

teaching in the classroom and a devotion to touching students' lives. In a nomination letter, a former student wrote, "I still hear (Gary's) voice in my head every time I write a story." Alumni working as reporters, anchors and producers across the country often echo that statement.

Just before he retired, Gary was named the 2016 recipi-

ent of the prestigious Edward L. Bliss Award for Distinguished Broadcast Journalism Education, presented annually by the Electronic News Division of the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication (AEJMC) to recognize significant and lasting contributions to the field in the areas of teaching, scholarship, and service. He accepted the award last August at the **AEJMC National Convention** in Minneapolis.

When reflecting on this honor, Gary shared some thoughts about his legacy in broadcast journalism education:

"If someone were to say, 'What's your legacy here?', I would show them a big picture I that have of students at

graduation. Knowing that I can go and point to various people on that board and I can tell you where they're out doing good work in journalism and helping their communities under-

stand the kinds of things they need to know, that's extremely gratifying."

JMC Director Thor Wasbotten reflected on Gary's impact, "Gary was a mentor to me as well as a colleague and friend. He was a tremendously influential and effective teacher and provided service to all levels of our discipline and produced research that had national impact. Above all else, Gary accomplished all of this without compromising his principles and values of being compassionate, thoughtful, while maintaining the highest integrity and a genuine appreciation for others. We will miss him."

OU's Fischer named 2017 Bliss Award winner

The 2017 Edward L. Bliss Award for Distinguished Broadcast Journalism Education is awarded to Kenneth A. Fischer of the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of Oklahoma.

Three judges — all former heads of the Electronic News Division — selected Fischer based on materials submitted by colleagues and former students as part of the annual

nomination process.

"Ken is the quiet teacher who shuns the limelight but clearly has impact in the hearts and minds of his students," said Electronic News Division Head Indira Somani of Howard University I look forward to recognizing him in Chicago."

Besides shaping broadcast journalism at Oklahoma, Fischer has taught at five other ACEJMC-

accredited schools

and has kept in touch with former students around the world who are proud to call him their instructor and mentor. Prior to coming to Oklahoma, Ken supervised student-produced newscasts at five different PBS stations. At OU, Ken was faculty advisor when Sooner Sports Pad went on national and regional television in the last five years.

"He works with dogged determination to help his students succeed, and they love him for it," noted Laura Smith of the University of South Carolina, one of the judges. "And he's there to help his colleagues, too... always willing to serve on committees, panels and decision-making teams. He frequently does the behind-the-scenes work that makes us all look good. And he does it quietly, never seeking the limelight. He seeks instead to serve. He is a credit to the teaching profession and I couldn't be happier for him to win the Bliss Award."

Another judge, Tim Bajkiewicz of Virginia Commonwealth, observed Ken is the kind of colleague everyone wants to have. "In letters from former colleagues and students alike, I read similar, repeated comments about his passion, work ethic and dedication to broadcast journalism education," Bajkiewicz said. "He's someone who clearly cares deeply about what we do and why we do it. It's amazing to know he's finishing his Ph.D., since it's difficult to think that he could contribute even more to our discipline. Ken's commitment to service is unparalleled."

Perhaps one of the qualities that endear him to his students and colleagues is his broad sense of humor. Dale Cressman of Brigham Young, who led the nomination effort, noted Fischer's ability to "speak truth in a way that is both humorous and thoughtful."

Fischer's "generosity of spirit inspires loyalty from those with whom he works," Cressman added. An avid baseball fan with more than 40,000

cards in his collection (and a member of the Society for American Baseball Research since 1989), Ken never dreamed his stats would put him in the hall of fame.

But his good friend and past Bliss winner Bill Davie of Louisiana-Lafayette observed, "Ken refers to himself as a 'jobber,' but his colleagues are wise to know that just means he is the 'go-to guy' in every college venue where broadcast, journalism, and education go hand in hand. He has been indispensable on so many occasions where others receive trophies and awards, it is good to see him get one of his own."

Notably, one of Fischer's professors is a previous Bliss winner. Thomas Griffiths, Brigham Young emeritus professor, was the 2004 recipient.

"I'm delighted Ken is being recognized," Griffiths said. "He is very deserving."

The Bliss Award will be presented to Ken Fischer on August 10 in a ceremony at NBC's WMAQ in Chicago. *Dale Cressman contributed to this story.*

Foote to receive 2017 Burkum Service Award

Dr. Joe Stephen Foote, Dean Emeritus of the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of Oklahoma, is the Larry Burkum Service Award winner of the Electronic News Division for 2017.

Foote will be honored in August at AEJMC's annual conference in Chicago, in recognition for his outstanding service to electronic journalism education and to the profession. A committee of former END Division Heads and previous Burkum Award winners selected Foote from a pool of nominations.

"This is amazing," Foote said when he learned of the honor. "I've served on these committees before, and I know the caliber of people who are nominated. That the committee would select me is truly an honor, and I'm deeply touched."

"When I came to my first AEJMC as a grad student, I felt like I had found a home," Foote said. "This division has been such an important part of my professional life, and I'm truly honored to be recognized in this way."

Foote is beloved for his years of leadership at AEJMC, and his work with journalism programs around the world, including the remote locales of Nepal, Pakistan and Bangladesh. In the

United States, Foote built programs at Southern Illinois-Carbondale, Arizona State University and, most recently, at the Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication at the University of Oklahoma. It was there Foote oversaw both the development of new curriculum initiatives as well as the building of a state of the art multimedia facility that is leading the way in journalism and media education today.

"A truly extraordinary teacher influencing the lives of thousands, Dr. Foote has the unique gift to focus on the single individual," said Dr. Bill Silcock in nominating Foote. "He remembers names. He encourages growth. He recognizes achievements in others. He serves."

In addition to his development of programs in the U.S.,

Dr. Foote was a founding member of the World Journalism Education Conference, which to date has held four different conferences in Singapore, South Africa, Belgium and New Zealand.

"He handles the diversity of the council members and

variety of WJEC locations with respect and compassion," said Heather Birks, Executive Director of the Broadcast Education Association and a WJEC colleague of Foote's. "He is patient, instructive, and intuitive as he works through concerns regarding the interests of all involved. His leadership and involvement brought in acclaimed international speakers, sparked collaborative partnerships and unified journalism education. I was in awe of Joe... I still am."

In addition to expanding journalism education across the globe, Dr. Foote has been a part of 27 ACEJMC accreditation site visits. 17 as chair of those teams. He has served in numerous positions of leadership for AEJMC, including head of the (then) Radio-Television Journalism Division, the Long-range Force, and President of AEJMC.

Funding Committee, Chair of the Internationalization Task "Not bad for a guy who started as an announcer and reporter in Durant, Oklahoma in the mid

'60s," noted one of Foote's admirers.

The Burkum Award will be presented to Joe Foote on August 10 in a ceremony at NBC's WMAQ in Chicago as part of the Association for Education of Journalism and Mass Communication's 100th conference.

The Larry Burkum Service Award is presented by the Electronic News Division of AEJMC. The award recognizes an electronic journalist or journalism educator who has demonstrated extraordinary service to journalism education. Larry Burkum served the Electronic News Division as secretary, newsletter editor and webmaster from 1995 to 2005. He was presented the inaugural Burkum Award at the 2005 AEJMC convention in San Antonio, Texas.
