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Dupont First Ever Bliss & Burkum Double Winner

The winner of this year's Edward L. Bliss Award for Distinguished Broadcast Journalism Education and the Larry Burkum Service Award is, for the first time in division history the same professor.Dr. Nancy Dupont is the first faculty member to win both awards in the same year and first from the University of Mississippi School of Journalism and New Media to receive the Edward L. Bliss Award.

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Dr. Dupont responded with pure joy at the news reflecting on the meaning of both tributes, "I think the awards mean how much some students were touched by my career. I never will believe the number of former students willing to write for me!"

Associate Professor Mary Rogus of the Scripps School of Journalism at Ohio would agree. A past Bliss Award winner herself and member of the Bliss committee, she noted, "Dr. Nancy Dupont is the consummate electronic journalism educator. The quotes from her students are inspiring. Her service to broadcast journalism education through both AEJMC and BEA is unparalleled. But it is from the one-on-one conversations about teaching that I always walk away with something unique I can take back to my classroom."

Another member of the Bliss Committee, Dr. Laura Smith of the University of South Carolina, reflected on her devotion to student-centered learning and elevating the profession through classroom instruction. "For decades, Nancy's been dedicated to the development and well-being of her students, the ongoing evolution of our industry, and organizations like ours which support the craft of broadcast news and digital storytelling. Doing what we do ... and doing it well ... is embodied in Nancy. She's an amazing teacher and colleague."

Electronic News Division Head Ken Fischer, a past Bliss winner and one of the judges this year, observed, "Nancy is the complete package. She is a long-time professional with years of service to organizations. Her classroom teaching has put young professionals into newsrooms across America." Joining Fischer in recognizing her leadership is another Bliss and also a Burkum Award winner, Dr. Bill Davie, Louisiana-Lafayette Professor of Communication who focused on Dupont's scholarship. "She not only teaches her students the best ways to write their first drafts of history with compelling words, pictures, and sounds, but she also has taught them the long view of journalism."

New Editors take over EN division Journal

Electronic News is under new editorial management with three editors chosen to move the quarterly journal forward in research and scholarship. Leading the new team is the interim dean of the School of Journalism and New Media at the University of Mississippi, Dr. Debora Wenger. Joining her as Associate Editor is Dr. Keren Henderson and Founding Editor Dr. Robert Papper, both faculty members at the S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications at Syracuse University.

Electronic News has gained a worldwide reputation for applied research through peer-reviewed articles, invited essays, and book reviews. Dean Wenger's scholarship closely aligns with the journal's mission. "In fact, the first scholarly article I ever published was in Electronic News in 2008 and that success gave me the confidence to continue researching and publishing," she stated, adding that Electronic News provides a valuable platform for professionals "at the intersection of the industry and the academy." The editorial team will bring more "inclusion of voices that have not always been well represented in our discipline," stated Wenger.

Prior to joining the academy, all three editors worked television news. Dr. Henderson was a producer at WAFB-TV in Baton Rouge, and has published articles in Electronic News analyzing the state of journalism in contemporary local television newsrooms. She considers the journal to be a "home for big thinkers across news platforms as well as a bridge between scholarship and practice." Wenger and Henderson are working in tandem with Founding Editor, Bob Papper, who has served with three previous editors for Electronic News – Charles Tuggle (North Carolina), Anthony Moretti (Robert Morris University), and Jenn Burleson (Virginia Tech).

Moretti is helping the new editors become familiar with publisher Sage's online interface. In 2021, the journal will be re-branded as Electronic News: a Journal for Broadcast and Mobile Journalism to reflect the division's new name. Martha Avtandilian is the publisher's representative at Sage Publications headquartered in Thousand Oaks, California, and says she will be working on improving the journal's impact and reach.

Lessons Learned After A Year of Pandemic Teaching

Earlier this year, I became one of three Electronic News members elected to an AEJMC leadership position. First and foremost, I'd like to thank you for having confidence in me (and for your votes). Second, I'd like to congratulate Mary Rogus (PF&R) and Greg Perreault (Research). They will serve you well!

My job over the next three years will be to represent you all on the Standing Committee on Teaching. Teaching brings me incredible joy. I love research and service. But to me, there's nothing better than the feeling you get when one of your students turns in a piece of journalism that demonstrates they've been paying attention. They read, listened, thought about it, went out into the field, tried something new and came up with something worth crowing about. Even the small victories are just that – victories.

When it comes to my own learning curve as a teacher, I feel the same way. We live, we learn. Dupont Wins Bliss and Burkum, Cont.

Also noting Dr. Dupont's love of history, Burkum Award winner and Interim Dean Debora Wenger at the University of Mississippi summed up her legacy. "Nancy has set the standard for what it means to be a teacher-scholar. She never forgot to put the learning of students first, but she also loved exploring journalism history and helping us to put our profession in context."

Presented annually by the Electronic News
Division of the Association for Education in
Journalism and Mass Communication, this award
recognizes an electronic journalism educator who
has made significant and lasting contributions to
the field. Bliss Chair Dr. Bill Silcock, emeritus
assistant dean at the Walter Cronkite School,
noted her exemplary leadership. "Nancy is an
ideal role model for 21st-century journalism

education impacting students, fellow faculty, and global audiences."

Silcock and Burkum Award Chair Professor Hub Brown, dean of the College of Journalism and Communications at the University of Florida, made the joint announcement at the Broadcast Education Association News Division meeting in April 2021. Dupont had served twice as chair of that organization as well as head of AEJMC-END (video link below). https://youtu.be/ httKXpKenuVQ

Dean Brown noted what a friend and example Professor Dupont has been for all of us. "Over many years now, you would be hard-pressed to find anyone who has had a more positive impact on our division, been a better guide, leader, and

role model than Dr. Nancy Dupont. She has been an unparalleled force for good in our division, in AEJMC, and electronic journalism writ large."

Fellow Burkum committee member, Dr. Tim Brown, associate professor at the University of Central Florida, "Without a doubt Dr. Dupont has been a model for so many of us over the years. Her numerous stints as division head and chair are obvious examples, but it's also the 'casual conversations' and the informal 'task force' leadership roles that rarely get documented that make her so special. When journalism education has called, she has answered. She is truly worthy of this honor."

During the announcement ceremony BEA Executive Director Heather Birks pointed to Dupont's service leadership. "When I think of individuals who are always ready to get involved, available to give advice and make things happen or provide a unique solution to a problem, Nancy Dupont is the top of mind. Her extensive and "extraordinary" service to journalism and journalism education exemplifies the AEJMC Electronic News Division's Larry Burkum Service Award."

AEJMC's incoming president echoed those sentiments in her note of commendation. "I offer my heartiest congratulations to Professor Dupont. Faculty members like her, with significant professional experience and a willingness to connect with colleagues across the country through service work for national associations, enrich the educational experiences of undergraduates," said Dr. Susan Keith, associate professor at Rutgers University and president-elect of AEJMC.

In the spirit of the unprecedented celebration, Dupont will be honored with both awards at the annual AEJMC-END social on August 5, 2021. And in honor of her distinguished career, the Mississippi Scholastic Press Association has established the Nancy Dupont Broadcast Adviser of the Year Award for the top MS HS broadcast program adviser.
