Also, include the speakers' names, affiliations and brief backgrounds. Lastly, include a tentative Panel Title; write it so that it is broad enough that other groups will want to co-sponsor.

A panel typically has four speakers and preferably with gender, ethnic and institutional balance. Please try to get commitments from speakers before submitting the proposal whenever possible—and please indicate in the proposal whether the speakers are committed.
