Pre-conference to focus on developing your career

cademic folklore suggests the rewards of earning tenure and promotion often include academic freedom and a stronger sense of job security.

But what does tenure and promotion in the 21st century actually look and feel like for professors? Does tenure and promotion still matter? Moreover, did it ever matter?

Maybe you are on track for tenure and promotion from assistant professor to associate professor, or maybe you have already earned tenure and promotion to full professor. Either way, if you have ever had the above questions or questions about what is next for you in an academic career – you are in luck.

A group of sages will gather Aug. 2 for a pre-conference AE-JMC workshop focused on career development. They will share their experiences as well as answer audience questions concerning tenure, promotion, and rising through the academic ranks in the 21st century.

AEJMC 2021 will be held virtually Aug. 4-7, with a day of pre-conference workshops set for Tuesday, Aug. 3. To register for the conference, visit http://aejmc.org/events/virtual21/register/.

The Small Programs Interest Group (SPIG) will collaborate this year with Internships and Careers Interest Group (ICIG) to co-sponsor the pre-conference workshop that explores career development from 1:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. (CT).

The workshop will run in three parts, and registered attendees can join in the discussion as time allows. The workshop is free to all registered conference attendees, and the workshop link will be accessible Aug. 2 through the conference's virtual portal.

Each session is expected to run approximately 75 minutes.

Here are the workshop details, including topics and expected panel participants:

Part 1: "We've Earned Tenure & Promotion! Now What?!"

As an assistant professor, the first three to five years in rank are focused toward acquiring credibility and national recognition through research and creative works. The reward of earning tenure and promotion provide relief and potentially a reduced-stress workload, at least during the dossier evaluation period. But what's next? This panel will address this question and offer ideas for how to avoid academia burnout and progress as an associate professor.
